Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter

- Open door admission shelter
- Intake approx 6,500 animals a year







Field Services Division

- Respond to approx 11,000 calls for service a year
- 24 hour emergency response
- Provide proactive community services







Based on Community Policing Model

Defined as "a philosophy that promotes organizational strategies, which support the systematic use of partnerships and problemsolving techniques, to proactively address the immediate conditions that give rise to public safety issues such as crime, social disorder, and fear of crime."

US Department of Justice





What is Community Animal Control?

- Same as Community Policing, but with an emphasis on a community's animal issues
- Varies from jurisdiction to jurisdiction








Community Animal Control

- First, identify the problems and problem locations
- Then ask "How can these problems be resolved?"







- City of Watsonville, CA 10 areas patrolled for one year
- Officers spoke with residents BEFORE there were issues







- Pick targeted areas
- Drive through locations slowly, windows down







Stop and speak to people in a friendly manner







- Officers acted less law enforcement and more educational
- Officers provided bilingual educational material BEFORE there were issues
















- Impoundment rates fell
- Spay/Neuter compliance went up
- Community viewed Animal Control as helpful and came to our shelters for education





- Targeted areas in City of Watsonville
- Maps generated by 911 Center
- Foot patrol of areas







- Officers dress in polo shirts without badges
- No enforcement action unless egregious animal neglect/cruelty found







Children-Specific Items

- Junior Law Enforcement Badge Stickers
- Tattoos
- Toys to play with their animals







- Knock on EVERY door in targeted areas
- Meet apartment managers beforehand and set up community meeting







 Focus on intact animals, dogs running loose and animal neglect and cruelty

Provide free items (toys, dog houses, etc)











- DO NOT FOCUS ON LICENSING
- Work with the community to resolve what is truly important for the ANIMALS

































- Dogs removed from tethers
- TNR colonies started
- Dogs and cats provided routine vaccinations and veterinary care
- All WITHOUT enforcement action







- Gave away free dog houses
- Provided hundreds of free Kongs and other enrichment toys for backyard dogs
- Provided hundreds of free collars, tags, leashes and bowls
- All items were donated through media campaigns





- People have begun to view Animal Shelter as community resource
- Officers have begun providing community oriented services daily







Day to Day Work

- 1 compartment in each ACO truck filled with free items
- Flea medications, bowls, leashes, collars, tags, food, enrichment toys, runners, etc

Grants

- \$22,500 to purchase dog houses and dog trolleys ASPCA
- \$86,000 for spay and neuter of cats in Watsonville –
 Petsmart Charities
- \$15,000 spay/neuter CA Department of Agriculture





 Provides access to high quality, low-cost spay/neuter services for ALL resident dogs, cats, and rabbits of Santa Cruz County







- No income requirements
- Program pays for itself
- Program can also make money!








- Average cost of supplies and material with veterinarian's salary
- Charge for additional required services:
 - rabies vaccination
 - dog license
 - microchip







Spay or Neuter Surgery Costs:

- Dog \$100
- Cat \$50
- Rabbit \$75
- Animals over 100 lbs, in heat, pregnant or cryptorchid add \$20
- Animals over 7 years of age are required to receive a blood panel for an additional \$55





Fees for Additional Required Services:

- Microchip ID including registration \$25
- License for altered dog \$29
- Rabies vaccination (dogs and cats) \$10

Actual Cost:

- Microchip \$5 (plus immediate return if ever impounded)
- License Full Profit
- Rabies \$2





- Fix-a-Pit and Chihuahua Program
- Fee for all Pitbulls and Chihuahuas is \$50.00
- Approximately 33% of dogs that enter the Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter locations are either Pit Bulls or Chihuahuas

New Animal Services program takes educational angle

WATSONVILLE -- Since Feb. 1, Animal Services officer Shauna Urratio has purposely tried to strike a less imposing figure.

Instead of hair pulled into a slicked-back ponytail, she lets her dark mane loose. Instead of the typical tan, formal collared shirt officers wear, she dons a dark blue short sleeve polo shirt. She still wears the standard green pants, but her badge is less conspicuous and her utility belt is not carrying as many intimidating items.

The metamorphosis is all part of a new pilot program by Santa Cruz County Animal Services designed to focus on education and community outreach as opposed to simply responding to complaints and violations.

"This is about showing the more friendly side of Animal Services," Urratio said. "We want to educate the community about the services and special deals available."


