Draw up dexmedetomidine, ketamine and hydromorphone separately, then combine in the same syringe. This combination of drugs is known as *puppy magic* and is administered IM.

*Puppy magic* can be used even if the patient has gabapentin, trazodone, acepromazine/hydromorphone, etc., on board. The hydromorphone is dosed lower than a standard premedication dose; therefore, the hydromorphone may be excluded or adjusted in the *puppy magic* injection at the veterinarian's discretion. The remaining hydromorphone from the canine premedication chart will be given also at the veterinarian's discretion.

After the *puppy magic* drugs have had an appropriate amount of time to take effect (typically 15-20 mins) and the patient is safe to handle, give the standard induction agent (ketamine/midazolam) to effect, if needed. If the dog is unable to be safely handled, redose the *puppy magic* in full or partial increments at the veterinarian's discretion.

Turn ISO on only after the patient breathes on their own - typically requiring 0.5-1.5% ISO.

Heart rate may occasionally be 40-50 bpm. Ensure the patient is breathing well and pulses are strong. Place an esophageal stethoscope to assist with evaluation.

1/4 of the *puppy magic* dose may be administered for light sedation, as needed (i.e., recheck of an anxious dog).

Canine patients can be induced in their crate or transitioned to a dog squeeze cage if necessary (similar to community cats).
