## Kitten Care Tips

### Food

- It's very important to remain consistent with the food you're feeding your kittens — changes in diet can cause diarrhea.
- If you plan on switching to a different kitten food, do so gradually and make sure it is life-stage appropriate, so the kittens are receiving enough calories. Consider feeding dry food and canned food. You can also try switching up your food brands for finicky eaters.

**\*For experienced bottle feeders only:** Try various sizes and brands of bottles and nipple attachments to find the best option for your kitties.

### Litter

- All kittens under 4 months of age and nursing mama cats should be using **non-clumping** litter. Kittens tend to eat their litter, and if it clumps in their digestive tract, it can become very serious.
