Words matter

OBJECTIVE - not influenced by personal feelings, interpretations, or prejudice; based on facts; unbiased: *an objective opinion*.



•Think: "just the facts" - police Officer



SUBJECTIVE - based on or influenced by personal feelings, tastes, or opinions: *his views are highly subjective*

•Think: creative writing - **S**hakespeare









Using your body to communicate

- Working with unknown cats
- Important to appear non-threatening





Talk to the cat first





Your body posture

- •Turn to side
- Move slowly
- Bring hand from underneath



Blink

- Affiliative signal that you can use too
- Avert eyes
- Look away





First contact









Cats and belly rubs





Scent

- Perfume
- Cigarettes
- Dog smells
- Other cat smells
- Pheromones





Escape routes

- Try not to trap cats
- Choice
- Feral box, paper bag


