

The ASPCA's Animal Emergency Preparedness Checklist is a tool to help define your community's resources and capabilities for responding to animals in an emergency.





This checklist is intended to help identify where a community is well-resourced and where additional support may be needed.

The checklist will be most effective in identifying strengths and shortfalls when completed by the agency/organization that has primary jurisdictional responsibilities for animals in emergencies and is familiar with the community's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP).


This assessment should not be viewed as just an analysis tool, but also as a blueprint for improvements in your animal response plans. If you're in the initial phase of planning, we suggest you first focus on high priority items marked with this symbol: \*\*.

We also encourage you to meet with appropriate partners in your community to formulate next steps to address gaps identified by the checklist.

The fillable, seven-page checklist can be completed, saved and printed if desired. Use the CLEAR button on the last page if you wish to clear the form and start over.

Is a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or Mutual Aid Agreement (MAA) with community or national animal welfare group established?  Sample MOU

Have number and species of animals who may require assistance during emergency/disaster been identified?  Pet ownership calculator			
Have animal species eligible for evacuation in the community been named?			
Have all potential sources of impacted animals (shelters, boarding, groomers, research facilities, breeders, veterinary clinics, zoos, etc.) been identified?			
Have those who can provide assistance for species requiring special assistance (e.g. large, injured, aggressive animals) been identified and confirmed?

Has a cache been established of necessary equipment and supplies to provide emergency sheltering for at least 50 small animals?			
Has a cache been established of necessary equipment and supplies to provide emergency sheltering for at least 50 large animals?
