- National Response Framework (NRF)



National Preparedness Goal

"A secure and resilient nation with the capabilities required across the whole community to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk."



FEMA: National Response Framework

- Created in 1979 and given the authority to provide for all disasters regardless of cause
- Incorporated elements of ICS into a federal emergency management plan referred to as the National Response Framework
- NRF provides context for how the whole community works together and how response efforts relate to other parts of national preparedness





More Resources – Enhanced Capabilities

- Resources doesn't necessarily equate to capabilities
- Large pool of responders
- Relevant experience or training
- Availability
- Equipment and Supplies
- Retention





2015 ASPCA Capabilities Project

 Develop a survey to determine local, state, and national resources and capabilities

 Develop a Community Assessment Tool for determining level of readiness

- In priority communities, perform a Needs Assessment
- Facilitate a 1-2 year Improvement
 Plan









- Phase 1: States September, 2015
 - Sent to state emergency management directors
 - Encouraged to forward to appropriate agency
 - Telephone follow-up to assist with completion
 - 49 states completed (98%)
- Phase 2: Counties November, 2015
 - Over 1M 33 counties (67%)
 - Sample of 25% of remaining counties 565 (74%)




Focus on three measures


- Organization and infrastructure

 - Shareable resources












Cache of supplies for small animals








Dedicated animal equipment








WSCARE Process


- Joint effort between Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) and the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA)
- Purpose was to determine animal response capabilities in the 39 counties and to validate NCARE
- Mailed to every Emergency Manager or known AHJ on 1 Feb 2019
- As of 1 Jul, 29 responses (74.4%)















Community Preparedness Checklist

An animal-specific Preparedness Checklist identifying all of the components we recognize as being critical for a community to be disaster resilient



Community Preparedness Checklist

- Fillable, seven-page checklist
- Identifies where a community is well-resourced and where additional support is needed
- Effective in identifying strengths/shortfalls if completed by those with primary jurisdictional responsibilities and those familiar with the local Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)
- Not just an analysis tool, serves a blueprint for improvements

The ASPCA's Animal Emergency Preparedness Checklist is a tool to help define your community's resources and capabilities for responding to animals in an emergency.
