

Humane Society Silicon Valley


- 49,000 sq ft main location
 - Gold LEED Animal Community
 Center
 - 3 Neighborhood Adoption Centers
- Intake ~6,100/year
 - ~3,000 kittens, ~900 adult cats
- Safety net for the community





Why portalize cages?

- Part of larger plan to increase feline life-saving capacity
- Length of Stay (LOS)
 - In discussion
- Inefficient processes
 - Cleaning
 - Animal flow





Challenges

- Staff believed they were doing a good job already.
- Feared euthanasia rates would increase.
- Did not understand how cutting holes saved lives.
- Change is hard!







Common Belief in Shelters:

"The more cages you have, the more lives you save."

THIS IS FALSE!!!



Overcoming Challenges

- Played LOS Game
 - Board meeting
 - All-staff meeting
- Incorporated LOS into organizational goals and culture
- Promised we would NOT increase euthanasia rates





Process

- Alleviate fears through communication / education
- Develop trust leap of faith on staffs' part
- Picked the winter to try it out
- Portalized in phases: (several months)
 - 1. Long-term stay: URI and Ringworm Isolation
 - 2. Moved through other holding areas
 - 3. Prevent impact to normal operations



Process

- Purchased plasma cutter ~\$2,500
- PVC handmade portals ~\$100-200
- Door template (local plastics store) ~\$5 each
- UC Davis Koret Shelter Medicine Program
- One-day training session
 - Facilities staff and volunteers
- Summer Camp: kids made beds



Results

In five years:

- Increased feline intake by 38.6%
- Increased feline adoptions by 44.6%
- Continuing the upward trend in FY18

	FY14	FY15	FY16	FY17
Intake	2,752	3,209	3,703	3,813
Adoptions	2,122	2,370	2,976	3,068
Save Rate	83.9%	88.10%	86.7%	90.6%


















Pro Tip: Make it easy for staff

Ensure each cage has:

-Cat Kuranda bed with bedding draped over

-Food and water dishes

-Toy

-Bedding under Kuranda bed

-Scratch pad

-Cage curtain on one side of one cage door

-Litterbox with towel underneath



Cat Cage Setup: Side-by-side open portal- small cages



Folded towel bed underneath

-Scratch pad

-Cage curtain on one side of one cage door

-Litterbox with towel underneath

Kootenai Humane Society

- Hayden, Idaho: 90 miles south of the Canadian border
- Only animal shelter in Kootenai County, population: 150,000
- 39 years in same location

2017 intake:2,835 (982 were kittens)2017 adoptions:2,189

KHS is a private, non-government, independent organization

Dr. Chumkee Aziz UC-Davis Koret Shelter Medicine Program

Dr. Aziz looked at all aspect of the shelter and recommended portals for the cat kennels.



Bedding, food, water, litter pan, and mobile area all in a 24" x 24" kennel





\$1,300 grant written through the ASPCA's Northern Tier Shelter Initiative

Cat waits on one side while you clean the other!







Twice as nice! Twice the size!
