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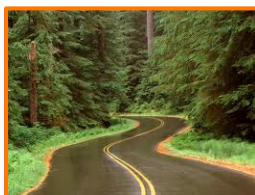

## Importance of Spay/Neuter for Shelter Animals

**Owner Compliance  
with mandatory sterilization  
AFTER adoption estimated <60%**

### Survey Shows... Reasons Not to Spay/Neuter

Pet is too young  
34%

Too expensive  
31%

Haven't gotten around to it  
24%

## Study Shows ...

**74 % of companion cats  
were spayed/neutered**

**Of 126 female cats,  
30 had a litter**

**20 of the 30 cats  
had a litter  
prior to being spayed**

**Of all litters produced,  
85% were accidental**

**Many do not have  
basic knowledge to  
prevent accidental  
litters**

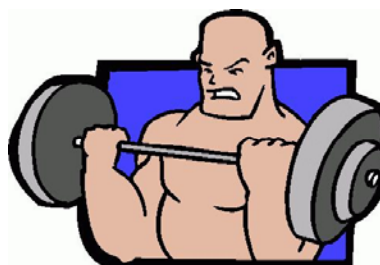

## How to Determine Shelter's Spay/Neuter Capacity?

### Staffing

- Veterinarian
- Veterinary technician
- Veterinary assistants
- Shelter staff
- +/- Volunteers



## How to Determine Shelter's Spay/Neuter Capacity?

### Determine time

- Identify/transport surgical candidates
- Perform
  - Pre-surgical examinations
  - Surgical preparation
  - Surgery
  - Recovery
  - Record keeping (patient, drug logs)
  - Recheck examinations
  - Prepare for next day of surgery
- Communicate with staff/adopters



## How to Determine Shelter's Spay/Neuter Capacity?

### Facility/Equipment

- Number of
  - Anesthetic machines
  - Surgery tables
  - Recovery cages



***Staffing + Time + Facility/Equipment  
=  
Number of Spays/Neuters  
Shelter can Safely Perform***



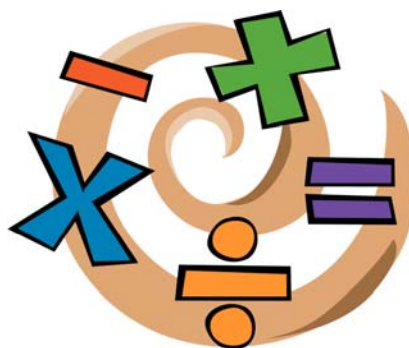
**How Many Animals to Spay/Neuter  
If All to Leave as Sterilized?**

***Average adoptions, for each month,  
can be used to estimate need for  
spay/neuter surgery***





**Oh NO!**  
**Not More MATH!**



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### Example: Adoption Driven Spay/Neuter

In June 2011, adopted

- 150 cats
- 175 kittens
- 180 dogs
- 50 puppies

= 325 Felines

- 10% = 293 Felines

= 230 Canines

- 20% = 184 Canines

**Some animals are  
already spayed/neutered!**

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## Example: Adoption Driven Spay/Neuter

June 2011

293 Felines Adopted

Divided by 16 = 18  
Felines per surgery day

184 Canines Adopted

Divided by 16 = 12  
Canines per surgery day

Shelter does surgery 4 days per week,  
for a total of 16 days per month

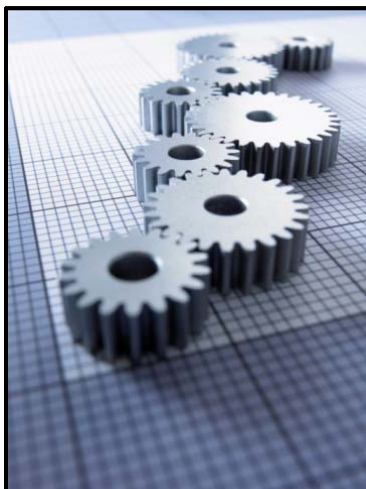

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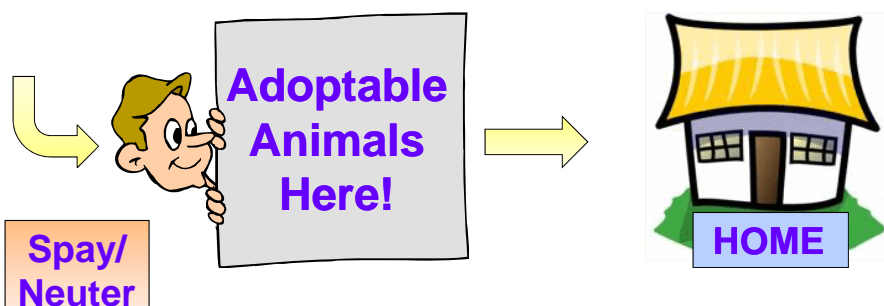
## How to Increase Spays/Neuters Performed Within Shelter's Current Capacity

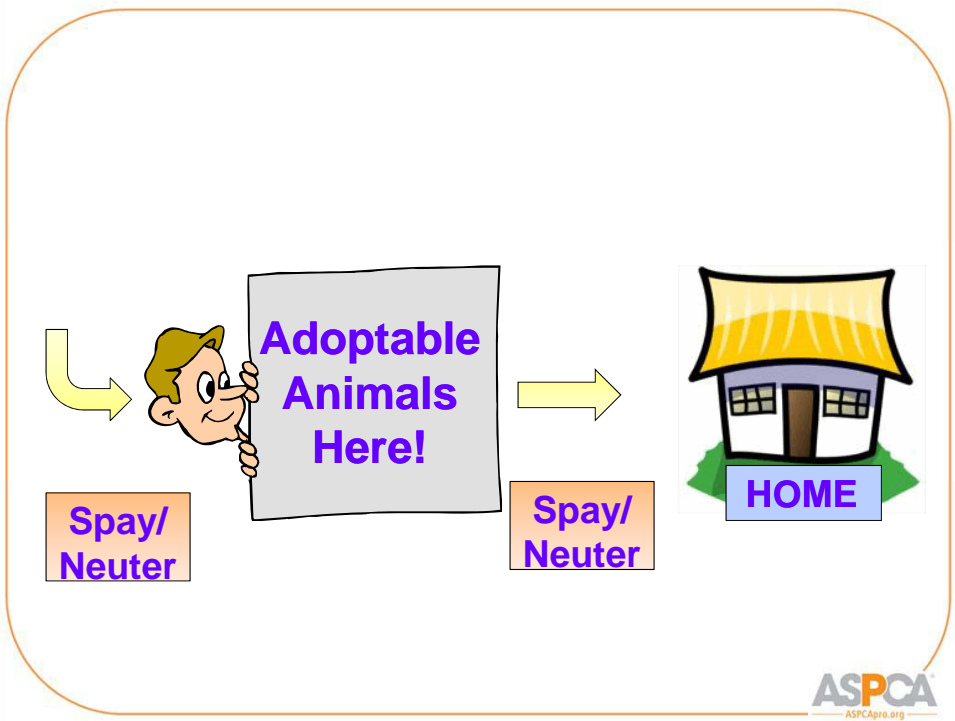
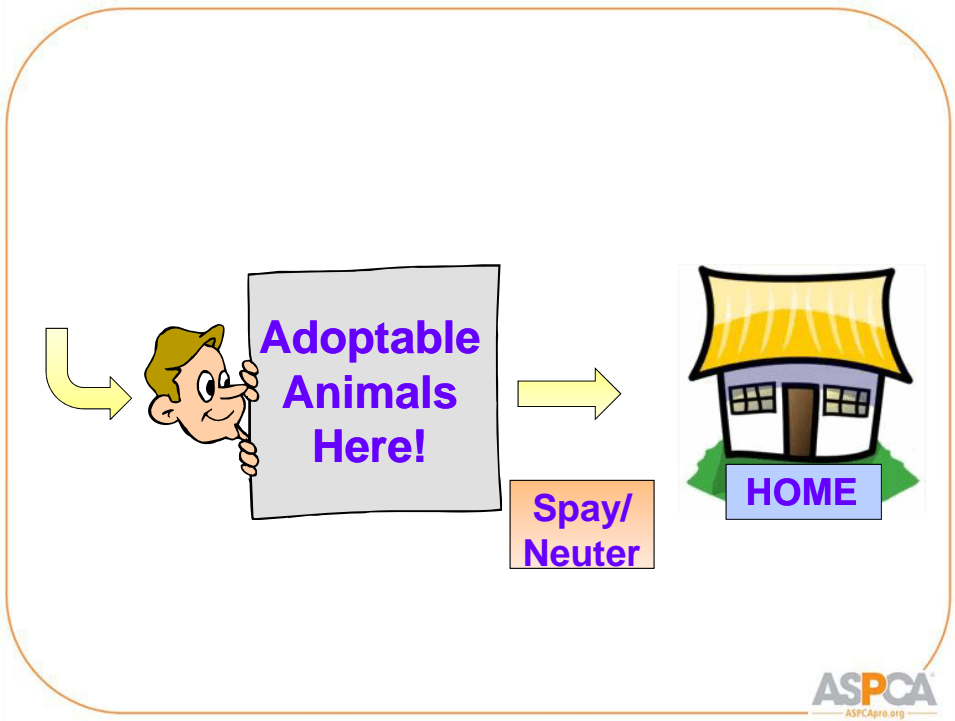
- Are preventive health strategies practiced in an effort to keep animals healthy and prepared for anesthesia and surgery?
- Are daily rounds performed to determine which animals are in next in need of spay/neuter?
- Are medical SOPs in place so medical staff can focus on doing surgery and not be frequently interrupted for other matters?
- Who is responsible for transporting animals to/from surgery?

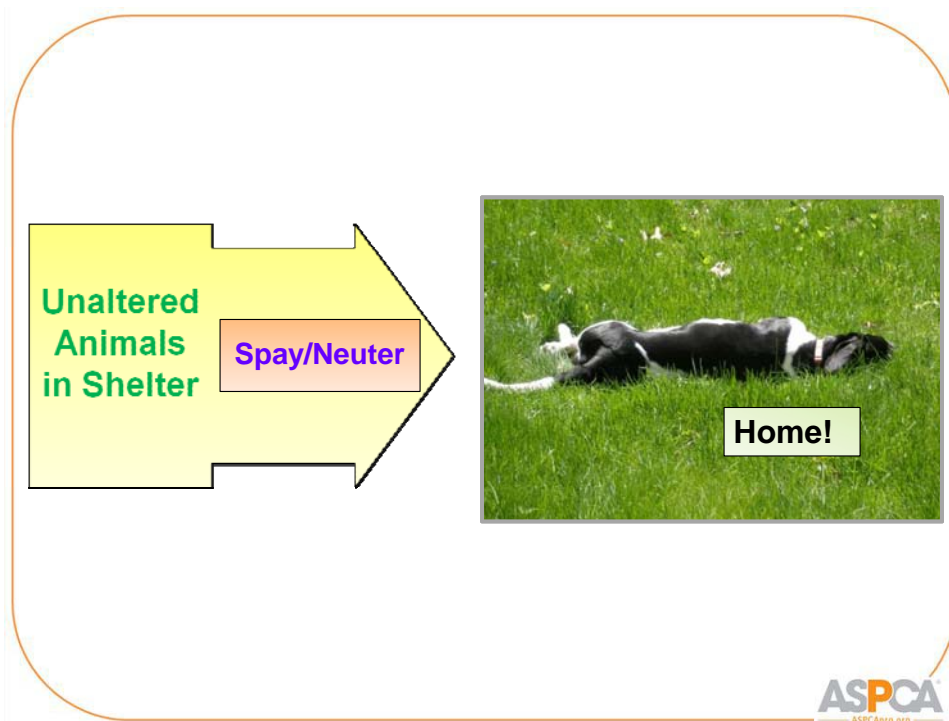
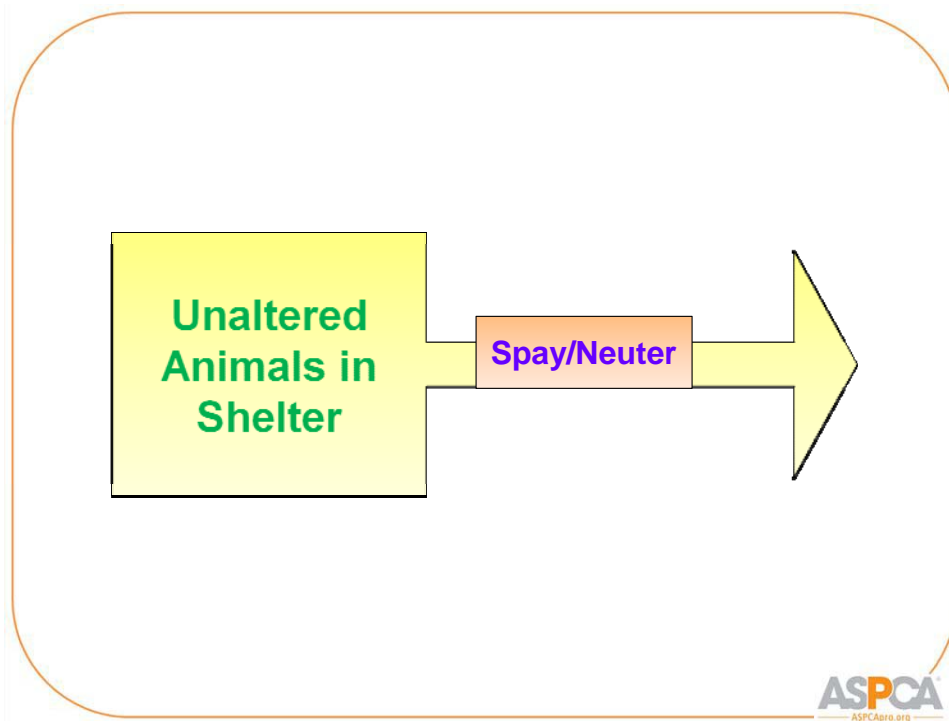


### How to Increase Spays/Neuters Performed Within Shelter's Current Capacity?

How is spay/neuter surgery schedule designed?

**Determine which staff members create surgery schedule and utilize consistent protocol to prioritize animals for placement on schedule**







## Increasing Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter



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## Increasing Shelter Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter

### ***Do what you do but do it more FREQUENTLY***

- Add extra surgery days or time
  - During week, on weekends, on evenings

### ***Considerations***

- Are surgical suite, recovery cages available at this time
- Staff overtime
- Contract veterinarians, other medical staff

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## Increasing Shelter Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter

### *Ask for HELP*

- High quality, high volume spay/neuter clinic, mobile clinic, MASH program
- Veterinarians in private practice

### *Considerations*

- Transport animals off-site, vehicle, staff, insurance
- Care of post-operative concerns
- Variable cost of spay/neuter
- Will local veterinarians perform pediatric spay/neuter?



## Increasing Shelter Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter

### *Ask for HELP*

- Volunteers for animal transport, cleaning, monitoring of recovering animals

### *Considerations*

- TRAINING
- Consistent schedule
- Liability



## Increasing Shelter Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter

### ***MASH program within shelter***

- Temporary surgical suite within meeting space/ auditorium

### ***Considerations***

- Cost and storage of equipment
- Staffing

## Increasing Shelter Capacity to Perform Spay/Neuter

### *Expansion of current on-site clinic to accommodate more animals*

- May also allow shelter to spay/neuter free-roaming cats or publicly owned animals

### *Considerations*

- Space, cost, staffing, zoning issues

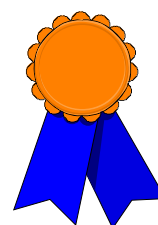


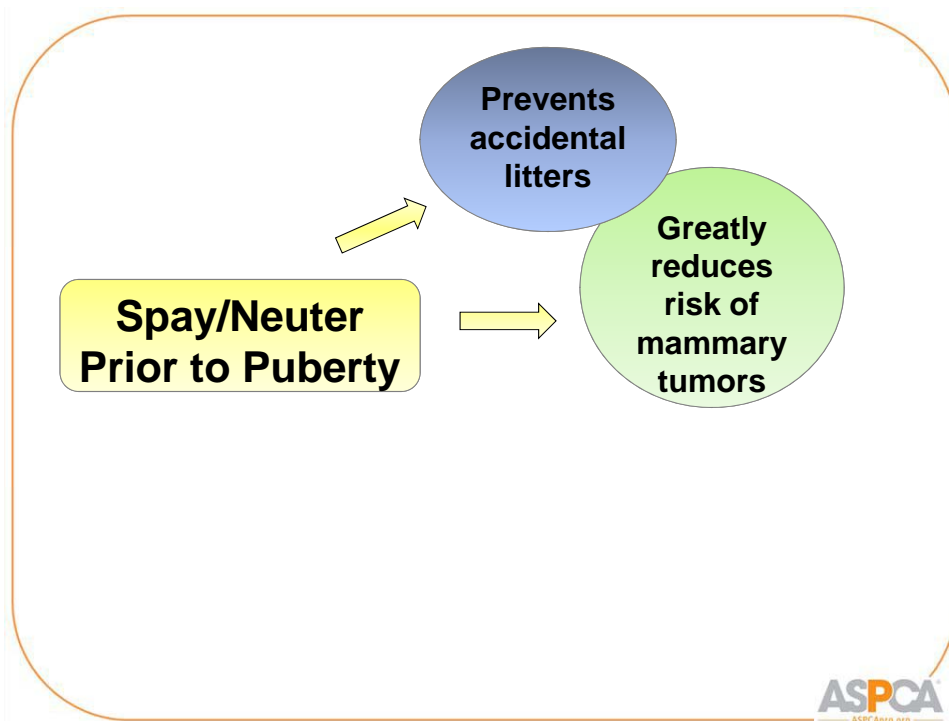
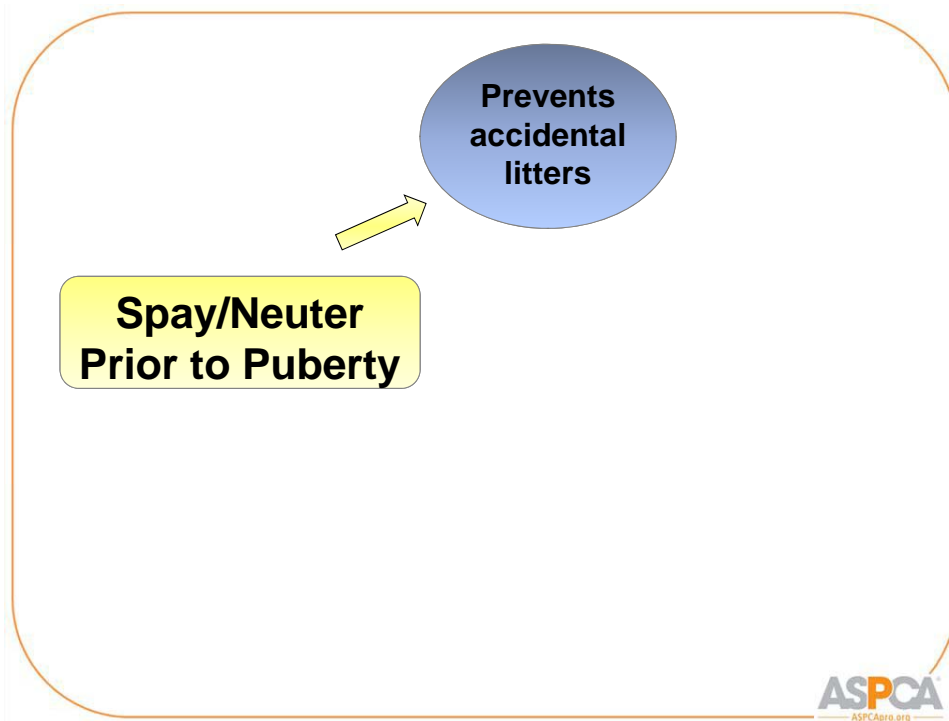

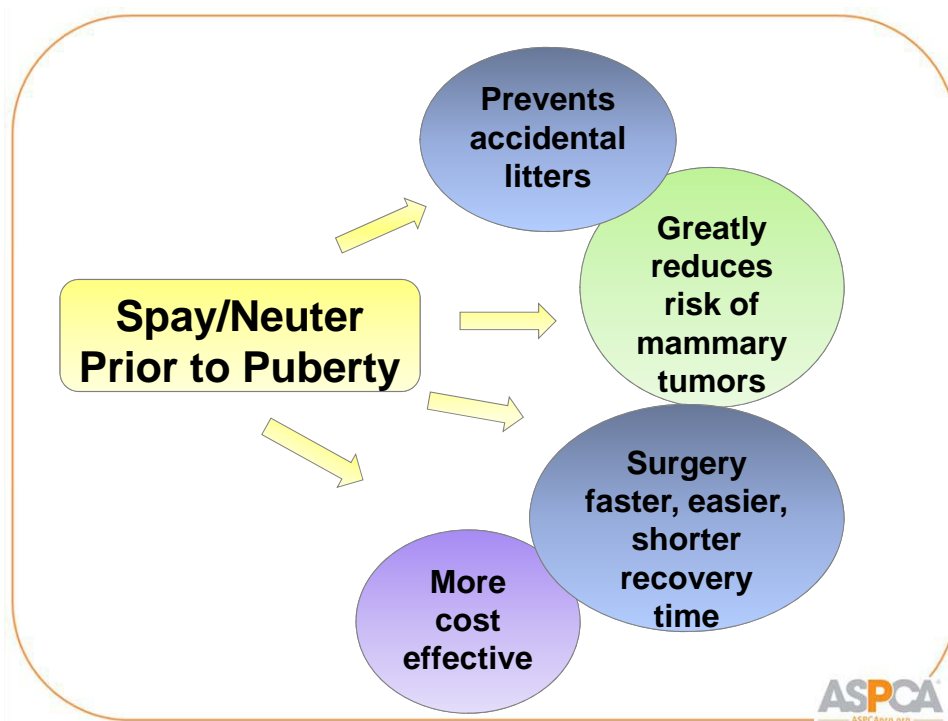
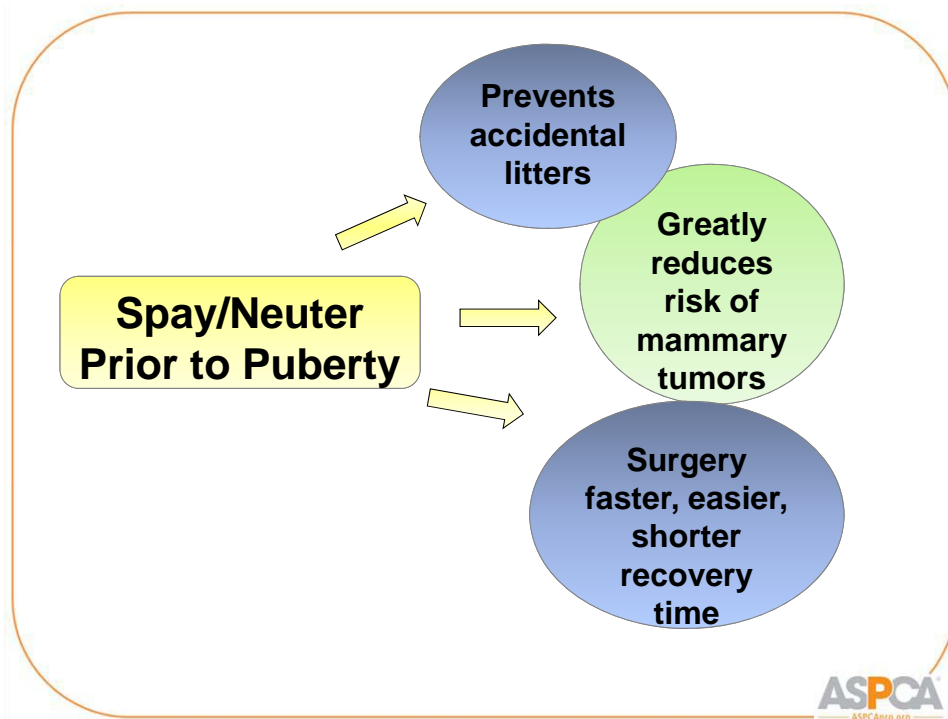
### *Defined as sterilization between 6 and 16 weeks of age*

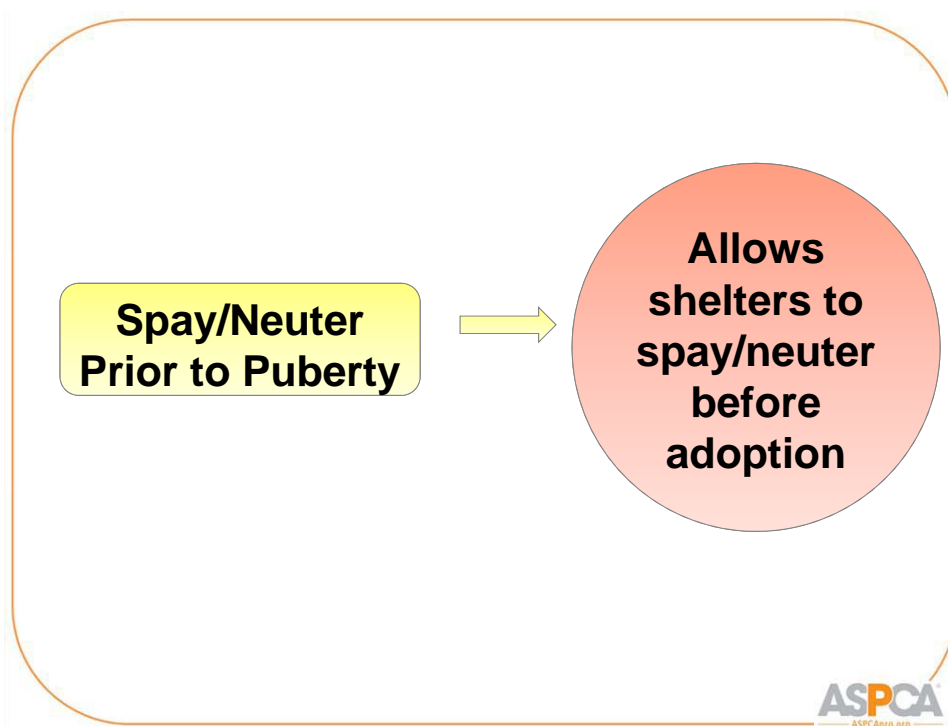

## Planning for a Large Adoption Event:

Limited Intake Shelter  
Provide Pre-Adoption Spay/Neuter



## Start Planning Early!



## Admission

Whether the event is an afternoon, a day or an entire weekend, first you must decide:

### How many pets should be available for adoption?

- How many puppies, kittens, cats and dogs?
- Based on history and trends of previous events?
- Availability of highly adoptable animals for intake?
  - Locally:
    - Private Homes, Municipal Shelters, Other Humane Organizations or Rescue Groups
  - Relocation:
    - Transport animals to your facility from more distant locations
- Ability to provide pre-adoption spay/neuter?



**HIGHLY ADOPTABLE is  
KEY**

**For a Large Event**



- Increase number of adoptions at event
- Quick Turn Around, Short Term Stay
- Return to sustainable shelter capacity immediately following event



## Timetable for Admission

When will you begin to increase the intake of highly adoptable pets?

- Several days before event?
- One week before event ?
- Two weeks before event?
- A month before the event?

Goals of admission schedule:

- Minimize holding time
- Coordinate admission with availability of spay/neuter services



## Recommendation:

Admit healthy highly adoptable pets for the event only in the numbers that you will be able to provide spay/neuter surgery the next day and can provide appropriate housing



## Increasing Spay/Neuter Capacity

Ways to push the envelop to temporarily\* increase spay/neuter capacity:

- Add a few surgeries to each existing clinic
- Add a spay/neuter clinic day
- Add a spay/neuter clinic in the afternoon if you usually do surgery only in the morning
- Add an additional surgical team to an existing clinic if surgery facility allows

\*These do not have to be measures that are sustainable for a prolonged time



## Housing Adoptable Pets

How/Where will you house the additional animals?

- Within the shelter?
- In Foster homes?
  - Decrease stress and crowding
  - Decrease transmission of infectious disease
  - Adequate disinfection protocols





## Avoid Overcrowding



## Foster Homes



- Inspect potential foster homes to determine fitness and capacity
- Provide necessary supplies
- Train foster families in proper hygiene and disinfection techniques
- Train foster families to observe for any signs of illness that may require treatment





## Prepare for Post-Adoption

Do you provide any health services to animals post-adoption?

- Specifically—Do you treat post-op complications associated with spay/neuter surgery?

Can you provide those services to increased number of animals following the event?

- Will you need to adjust staffing?
- Increase hours of operation?

## The Challenge Took Us to New Heights!

**ASPCA Challenge:** Adopt out at least 300 more dogs and cats between August 1 and October 31 than we did in the previous year.

We set our goal: adopt out 1000 more !!



## Our Shelter



Open Admission Shelter

ACO contracts

- sheltering for 6 municipalities

Animals Served 9300 annually

Length of Stay

- Dogs 6.2 days, Cats 15.7 days

Live Release Rate 92.2%



## Our Animal Population

Transfers make up 60% of all adoptions

- 2011 stray/surrender: 5,181
- 2011 Transfers: 3,927
- 2011 Adoptions: 6,997
- 85% dogs reclaimed
- 20% cats reclaimed

**88% of all local strays  
and surrenders are adopted**



## Our Veterinary Clinic

### Full Service Public Clinic

10,000 public appointments per year  
 Support all shelter medical cases/ACO emergency  
 4,800 spay/neuter surgeries annually

### Spay/Neuter Staff (a typical day)

1DVM, 3 vet techs, 2 pack/prep volunteers doing  
 2-hour shifts, 3 surgery recovery volunteers staggered  
 over 4 hours.



## The Challenge Changed Our Stats

## Efficiencies We Developed



Surgical exams the day before:  
weight, PE, write up drug log

Morning volunteer position developed  
to bring animals from shelter to the  
clinic the morning of surgery which  
freed up vet techs for patient care and  
surgery prep

Requested transfer agencies  
spay/neuter animals before sending



## Free Cat Fridays

Initially novel events for the community.

Clients lined up outside the adoption area before  
opening and adopted EVERY kitten and young  
cat.

**Kickoff was a record 118 adoptions in one day!**

Felines were adopted while recovering from  
surgery.

Several cats returned MONTHS after adoption to  
be spayed or neutered...



### ADOPTION FRENZY!

We continue with this program today when cat  
populations in the shelter warrant.

## Emergency responses

### Four Mile Canyon Fire

40 dogs/cats and 1 bird sheltered

6000 acres burned,  
3000 residents evacuated,  
169 homes destroyed

### Dome Fire

1 dog and 14 cats sheltered

1700 residents evacuated



15 dogs from HSUS response  
to a hoarding case in Montana



## 996 More Lives Saved! WE WON!!
